GETTING TO KNOW NSMC PRESIDENT DAVID ROBERTS, M.D.

e grew up one of six kids on the South Shore. He loved sports, played point guard on his high school basketball team and was skilled enough on the soccer pitch to earn a spot on the Colgate University varsity. A cardiologist, Dr. David Roberts has since had a distinguished 30-year career at North Shore Medical Center, serving in various leadership roles, including Chief of Cardiology and Chair of Medicine, and earning a reputation as a sharp wit on the medical staff. He recently began his tenure as NSMC President and sat down for an interview with NSMC Now.

Why did you want the job?

Given our challenging financial situation, I felt it was important that the person making the tough decisions about our future be someone who knows NSMC well. I also thought it was the right moment for a front-line clinician to lead.

How does your clinical experience benefit you as president?

I've spent my whole career trying to figure out the best way to take care of patients. It's in my DNA. I understand the stress of practice, and when I talk to other clinicians, they know that I have walked the walk that they have. That credibility helps.

What other experiences will you be calling upon?

In 2009, I was in a bike accident—broke my femur and underwent four surgeries to fix it. I spent months in the hospital and learned what it's like to be a patient. I became really interested in redesigning care to make it better for patients, including teaching empathy to providers because the things that you care about as a patient are not the things that you're taught to care about as a provider. That was brought home to me so acutely when I was in bed for so long.

Do you have a leadership philosophy?

I began playing sports when I was six years old, and I've always known what it feels like to be part of a great team—specifically the camaraderie and connection that can be generated by a shared sense of purpose. As a leader, I want to create a team that our staff wants to play on. That involves giving staff a say. If someone has a great idea about how to

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BUILDING THE FUTURE OF NSMC

Project on Schedule to Be Completed by Fall 2019

SMC broke ground last fall on its \$207 million plan to consolidate hospital-based medical, surgical and behavioral health services on its Salem Campus. Steady progress throughout the winter months included the blasting of rock ledge to construct an access drive connecting the front and back of the campus. In late May, the first pieces of structural steel went up for the building that will house the new Emergency Department, with its 62 private patient bays, and 24 private inpatient rooms.

"It's exciting to see the progress that has been made thus far," says Senior Vice President of Operations Mary Jo Gagnon. "The project is on schedule and on budget." When construction is complete, NSMC will be well equipped to provide a wide spectrum of services that address the region's most pressing health needs.

HISTORIC GIFT

Arthur Epstein Pledges \$5 Million for New Behavioral Health Center

ongtime friend and supporter Arthur J. Epstein has committed a gift of \$5 million toward NSMC's plan to build a new behavioral health center at the Salem Campus. The gift is the single largest donation in the 144-year history of the hospital.

In recognition of Epstein's extraordinary philanthropy, NSMC will name the new center in his honor. Scheduled to open in the fall of 2019, the state-of-the-art, 90-bed facility will enable NSMC to address the increasing demand for behavioral health services and provide much needed care to the children, adults and seniors of this region. "I'm proud to support North Shore Medical Center's efforts to address this dire need in our health care system," Epstein says. "Families will have a place to go where they are assured their loved ones will receive excellent care."

Now a resident of Brookline, Epstein previously lived with his family in Marblehead for more than 50 years. He made his first major gift to the Medical Center in 2002, followed in 2007 by a \$1 million donation in support of the Mass General/North Shore Center for Outpatient Care in Danvers. He has served on NSMC's Board of Trustees since 2006.

"We are deeply grateful to Arthur for his longstanding support," says NSMC President David Roberts, M.D. "His historic gift is a reflection of his kindness and concern for those in need, as well as an endorsement of the professional, high-quality care NSMC provides. His gift will benefit generations of North Shore families."

Isherwood walks every year for her 16-year-old cousin who was successfully treated for a brain tumor when he was 10. Dr. Preston, Chair of Obstetrics and Gynecology at NSMC, is a breast cancer survivor who received all of her care at NSMC and the Mass General/North Shore Cancer Center. "Stepping through the door as a patient was unnerving, but I immediately felt wrapped in a blanket of caring and competence. The high level of care didn't at all surprise me, but it had new meaning on the receiving side."

The meaning and emotion was palpable on WALK day. "A cancer diagnosis is hard on anyone," Dr. Preston says. "But when you see the number of other people who turn out for the WALK, you know you're not alone."

NSMC SHARES PRESTIGIOUS AWARD

SMC is part of a nationwide patient safety research group that received the John M. Eisenberg Award for Innovation in Patient Safety and Quality, health care's top safety honor.



Presented by The Joint Commission and the National Quality Forum, the recognition stems from NSMC's implementation of I-PASS, a package of interventions that standardize written and verbal communications during patient handoffs, either from shift to shift or from one service to another.

Supported by a CRICO grant, NSMC launched the I-PASS program last fall on Davenport 8 and 9 and the Intensive Care Unit at the Salem Campus. Much of the work has been led by the internal medicine residents, including Chief Resident Nuri Almaddah, M.D., and the incoming Chief Resident Jasleen Minhas, M.D. Based on early success, NSMC will be expanding the program to additional units throughout the hospital.
